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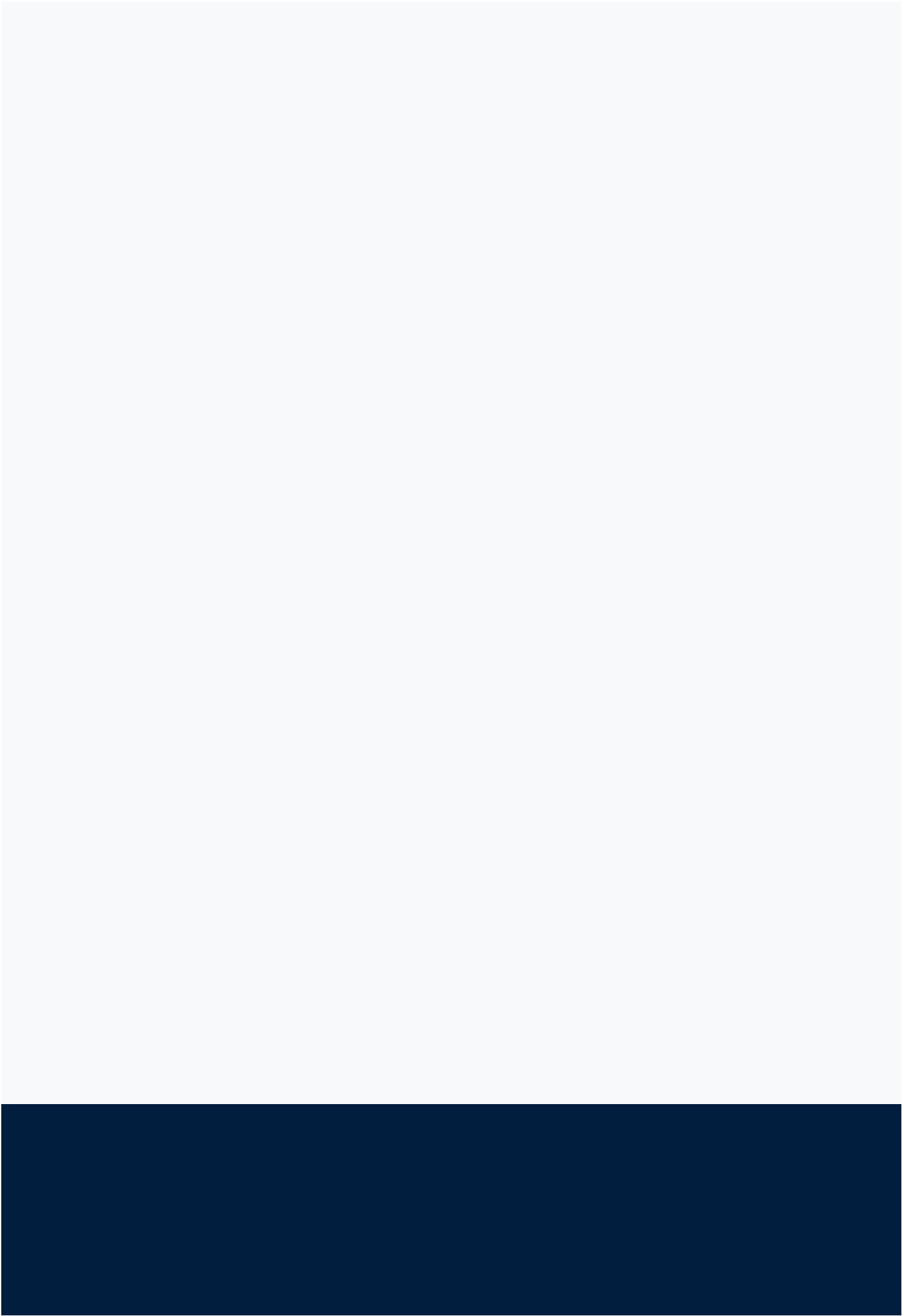

the 1990s, the number of people in the world who are under 15 years of age has increased from 1.1 billion to 1.5 billion, and the number of people aged 65 and over has increased from 0.2 billion to 0.5 billion (United Nations, 1999). The United Nations predicts that the number of people aged 65 and over will increase to 1.1 billion by the year 2050.

There is a growing awareness of the need to develop strategies to meet the needs of the ageing population. The World Health Organization (WHO) has developed a 'Global Strategy on Ageing and Health' (WHO, 1999) which aims to 'enable older people to live longer, healthier, and more active lives'. The WHO also has a 'Global Strategy on the Prevention of Falls in Older People' (WHO, 2001) which aims to 'reduce the risk of falls and the consequences of falls in older people'.

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
